Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Everyone have a right to feel happy and secure in school. We promote a caring atmosphere in which to work and play. Our children are supervised throughout the day and there is always an adult available should children want to discuss any concerns.

Our school rules are: e school rules are as follows:

- **We will respect everyone and everything in our school community, including ourselves.**
- **We will be ready to learn and do our best.**
- **We will enjoy school and have fun, but remember everyone else too.**

Through our House System, children can win points for their house by working well, and following the rules. Merits are awarded to pupils who have shown particular achievement or effort.

We celebrate learning successes as well as Wider Achievements, and welcome parents sharing any activities outwith school so we can celebrate these with the children.

This system has proven very successful in promoting positive behaviour, but behaviour issues will still crop up from time to time. Should behavioural difficulties arise, parents will be informed and possible courses of action will be explored together. In such cases, the full support of parents is expected to ensure the child conforms to the behaviour norms in school. In the rare and serious event when all else fails, Authority Policy regarding exclusion will be followed.

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

The Naturally D&G local provenance for a sustainable future ensures that meals are freshly prepared with seasonal ingredients and are free from undesirable additives.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Free Travel for 5 - 22 year olds

From 31 January 2022 all children and young people aged 5-22 will be entitled to free bus travel in Scotland. You can apply for free travel online from today at www.getyournec.scot (This cannot be done through your school)

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

The school offers a broad curriculum within the Curriculum for Excellence framework promoting an active approach where children are fully engaged with their learning.

Health and Well-being is the foundation of a pupil's readiness to learn. All curricular areas contribute to personal and social development: fostering co-operation, independence and self-confidence.

Our Health and Well-being programme covers physical, social, mental and emotional health such as hygiene, exercise and healthy eating. Units on issues such as bullying and the misuse of drugs provide children with the experiences to help them to make informed choices in their lives. We also teach units on Relationships, Sexual Health & Parenthood as per national guidance.

The Wider Curriculum:

We offer a wide range of extra-curricular activities throughout the year led by staff, Active Schools and our P6 & P7 Play Leaders. Activities that have been offered recently include: basketball, drama and Spanish.

In Calside Primary, we prepare our learners to be full citizens in society through many opportunities for the learners to participate in the life of the school. These include: Pupil Council, Eco Group, House Captains and Buddies.

We further enrich learning experiences through excursions related to learning. Recent trips have included the seashore and Hadrian's Wall. Upper school pupils also develop their resilience during a residential experience: details of this trip are shared with parents at the time.

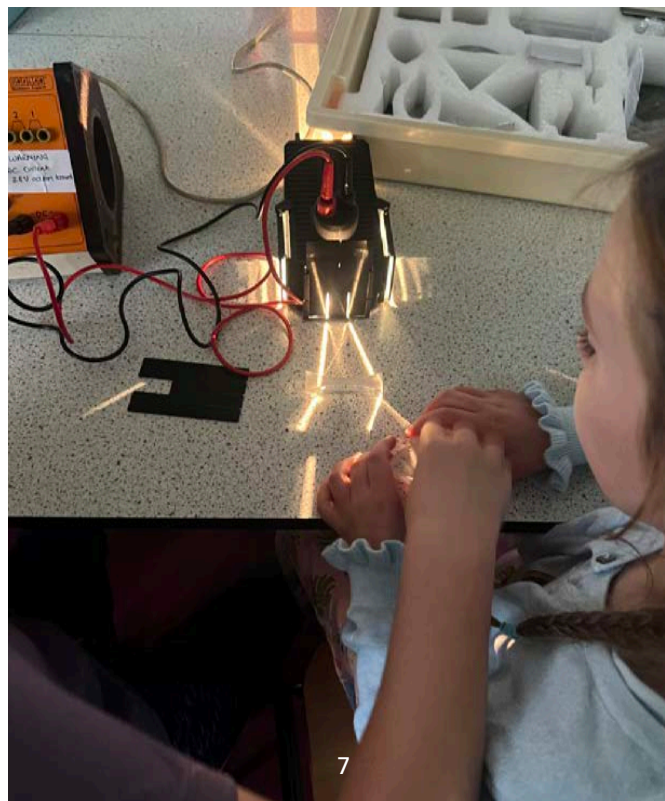

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Parental support is very important and we ask that you help with learning in the following ways:

- Take a general interest in your child's homework;
- Ensure that children do not become over-anxious or spend too much time on the homework task;
- Let us know if concerns have arisen so that these can be addressed by the teacher;
- Provide an environment which is suited to your child for the completion of homework;
- Where appropriate, assist your child with references/information for topic work;
- Encourage care, accuracy and tidiness in any set written homework without actually completing the task for your child;
- Encourage children to watch suitable information/news programmes which may be relevant to their schooling;
- Encourage the use of computer programmes other than games which could help support your child's learning.

Homework Tasks

The homework programme for the term will be advised through the termly class newsletter. If you require additional Literacy or Numeracy homework, please discuss this with your child's teacher. The class teacher will advise how the homework should be submitted, as this depends on the age and stage of the class.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

School Improvements

Each year the school will publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward. Key improvements we are currently targeting include:

- Reviewing and updating our Learning and Teaching policy to ensure it reflects our learning and teaching approaches
- Continuing to ensure that our curriculum covers the breadth of the Curriculum for Excellence, and develops skills for lifelong learning and for work;



- Continuing to develop the progression framework for meta-skills from Nursery through to P7
- Refining our progression frameworks for Literacy, Numeracy and Digital Literacy as needed, and supporting all staff to ensure consistency across our core Literacy, Numeracy and Health & Wellbeing approaches and interventions
- Developing our Parental Engagement and Involvement Strategy in line with the D&G guidance;
- Further developing the guidance for parents as to how they can support learning at home, through parental workshops and family learning guidance
- Having achieved our Silver award for the Rights Respecting Schools scheme, work towards our Gold award
- Auditing our practice against the Dumfries and Galloway Framework for Inclusion

The full School Improvement Plan is available on the school website, and a summary to parents is sent through the school maildrop twice a year.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. **Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.**

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
