Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Children learn best in a safe, secure environment. Our Health and Safety Policy, Risk Assessment Policy and Child Protection Policy have been put in place to address safety issues. However, if we are also concerned with children's emotional and social development and wish to encourage positive attitudes to self and others, we need to have rules for acceptable behaviour.

Our aim is to ensure that through the establishment of reasonable rules for behaviour, acknowledging and praising good behaviour and consistent, fair and acceptable methods of dealing with problems that children will benefit from learning in an atmosphere of tolerance and respect for all.

The rules throughout the school are positive and few in number, setting an expectation that children will be well behaved rather than that we expect to have to deal with people who behave badly. Every opportunity is taken to praise good behaviour and on the rare occasions that children have to be reprimanded there is an understanding that everyone gets the chance to start afresh.

Through our learning dispositions we encourage and develop co-operation, curiosity, independence, challenge, resilience and success. Each week class teachers award Pupil of the Week certificates based on success and achievements during that week. We celebrate our successes at weekly assemblies, in our fortnightly school newsletter, in the press and partner / community websites and also on our celebration of achievements star board.

School Uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. For more information on School Uniform, Dress Code, and School Clothing Grants visit www.dumgal.gov.uk

Whithorn school uniform consists of: black / grey trousers / skirt, school polo shirt (maroon, gold or white), school sweatshirt / fleece (maroon), gym shoes to change into during the school day. School ties are issued to P1 and can be worn on special occasions, e.g. choir / recorder group and festivals. Please ensure that you label your child's clothes. Sweatshirts / polo shirts can be ordered during the school year. Order forms can be obtained from the School Office. Children are expected to change for PE lessons.

Clothing which is unacceptable in school under any circumstances would include items which:

- Could potentially encourage factions (e.g. football colours) Could cause offence (e.g. anti-religious or political slogans)
- Could cause health and safety difficulties (loosefitting clothing, dangling earrings)
- Are of flammable materials which may be a danger in certain classes
- Could cause damage to floors
- Carry advertising, (such as alcohol or tobacco)
- Could be used to inflict damage on other pupils.

Financial Support for Children and Families

Grants and Bursaries Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful. Further information and an application can be made at: mygov.scot website or call us on 0800 182 2222.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

The Naturally D&G local provenance for a sustainable future ensures that meals are freshly prepared with seasonal ingredients and are free from undesirable additives.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed. In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day. Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals. For more information visit

Special dietary requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child / children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day i.e. doctor / dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3. In Garlieston we strive to provide a broad and challenging curriculum. Lessons will be engaging, inspiring and relevant to everyday life. Teachers will make connections between subjects, helping children make sense of the world. Teachers and children will work together to assess and discuss progress and



A range of wider achievement activities run throughout the session. Some activities are organised and run by school staff and parents and others through close links with community groups. Through the 9 Curricular Areas and our wider achievements programme, we also target the development of our young workforce, learning skills for lifelong learning and the world of work.



Pupils are encouraged to be part of school development and are elected onto groups for the year; Pupil Council, Eco-Committee, Health Promoting School, Rights Respecting School, Digital School and Learning for Sustainability. We also have elected Junior Road Safety Officers and House Captains. This enables pupils to develop skills of responsibility and co-operation.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights / Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Homework is a valuable link between school and home. Homework is usually set on a Monday in all classes with additional tasks being added throughout the week. Parents will discover that homework activities tend to be active and inclusive of the home environment. School uses homework diaries to inform parents of the various homework tasks for each week. Parents are encouraged to engage with homework and the homework diary.

Usually throughout the session, parents are offered many opportunities to join their children in learning activities such as Stay, Play and Learn sessions, Curriculum Workshops and family learning homework task grids.



Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or fulltime provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

School Improvements

Each year the school will publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward. In May / June of each year, the school publishes a Standards & Quality Report providing all stakeholders with a comprehensive summary of the school's work and learners' achievements over the last year. The first part of this report provides an overview of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities, while the second part gives information about, for example, how well pupils are learning and achieving; how well the school is supporting children/young people to develop and learn.



In June, we publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. Parents are issued with a summary of the Standards and Quality Report and the School Improvement Plan in June.



Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels ill during the school day and we feel that he/she would be better at home, we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc. First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more longterm planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child, are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
