Welcome from the Head Teacher Dear Parent / Carer

This prospectus is designed to give parents information about the aims, organisation and dayto-day running of Langholm Primary. If, however, there are any questions that are not answered by this prospectus, please do not hesitate to contact the school. The office is generally staffed throughout the school day and enquiries may be made either by telephone or by personal visit. It is our policy to work as closely as possible with parents and to maintain the best communication possible between school and home. If you have any suggestions, which might improve communication in general, or this prospectus in particular, we would be happy to hear them.

Langholm Primary School was opened in April 2014 and forms part of the Langholm Cluster which includes Langholm Academy and Canonbie Primary School. Mrs Lauren McLean-Gill is the Headteacher of all three schools.

The building is bright, modern, secure and very spacious and consists of eight classrooms, a nursery and a library. We have a large gym hall and use of three 3G pitches for sporting activities. All classrooms have direct access to the playground for outdoor learning and the nursery enjoys its own outdoor play area.

All children enter and leave the school through the main gate at the end of the car park dedicated to parental parking.

How the School Works

Class Organisation

Primary 1 has a maximum class size of 25. In primary 2 and 3 the maximum number of pupils is 30. Primary 4 through to Primary 7 the maximum number is 33. We can have composite classes that combine age groups. The maximum number of children in these classes is 25.

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Good behaviour is an essential pre-requisite for good learning. At Langholm Primary School we believe that every child has a right to the best education that we can provide, and therefore aim to provide secure, calm surroundings through strong, consistent and fair management of pupil behaviour. Providing this good learning environment is the most basic and important thing that we do.

We aim to achieve good behaviour:

- By using a positive approach to behaviour management.
- By having high expectations of pupils and encouraging them to have high expectations for themselves and others.
- By promoting positive staff relationships, pupil/ staff relationships and pupil/pupil relationships.

- By helping children develop confidence and self-esteem through our PSD (Personal and Social Development)
- By involving parents and promoting positive and mutually supportive home/school links.

The school approach to good behaviour is based on positive behaviour management. Clear simple rules for the classroom are created in the form of a contract between pupils and their class teacher at the beginning of term. Every pupil is then personally responsible for managing their own behaviour.

The positive behaviour plan has three sections: promotion of positive relationships, positive behaviour strategies and rewards and unacceptable behaviour strategies. In implementing the plan, the teacher ensures that the children are taught these regularly and that good behaviour is praised: the aim is to praise each child every day.

School uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. For more information on School Uniform, Dress Code, and School Clothing Grants visit <u>www.dumgal.gov.uk</u>

Parents can purchase our school uniform direct from Border Embroideries at any time during the year.

- Maroon sweatshirt bearing the school crest
- White polo shirt
- Black or grey trousers or skirt
- Black school shoes or plain black trainers (no logos)
- Children may wear cardigans and pinafores. School dresses may be worn in summer

The children should have T-shirts and shorts for PE. They also require suitable shoes for PE. The wearing of excessive jewellery and make-up is not permitted. Children with pierced ears should wear studs or sleepers in school. It is the policy of the authority that for safety reasons jewellery must not be worn during PE/games/swimming. Children who are unable to remove earrings should bring sticking plaster (e.g. Elastoplast) to cover the earrings. Pupils are regularly reminded about the requirement to wear appropriate clothing and footwear and about PE kits. Parents are asked to support the school's efforts to implement this dress code, which has now been in operation a number of years.

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

The Naturally D&G local provenance for a sustainable future ensures that meals are freshly prepared with seasonal ingredients and are free from undesirable additives.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school. Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE) is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds – in nursery, primary, secondary, at college, workplace or community learning. It takes a fresh approach to what, how and where young people learn. It aims to raise standards, improve knowledge and develop skills, closing the gap between the lowest and highest performers. How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

Parents, carers and other family members can and do make a real difference to children's education. When parents and schools work together, children do better. Children learn a great deal at pre-school and school and you can add to that learning by supporting them at home. For example, showing an interest in their homework and talking to them about it really helps them to learn. With support and encouragement, children find it easier to get into the homework habit.

Homework helps your child to:

- learn how to organise and manage their time
- take more responsibility for their own learning
- practise and build on what they have learned at school
- develop confidence to deal with frustrations, overcome difficulties and solve problems
- learn and work independently in the future.

Homework helps teachers to check your child's understanding of class work and keep track of their progress. It lets you find out what your child is doing at school and get involved in their learning. Children in P1 through to P7 should expect to receive weekly homework. Pupils may also be given research tasks to complete from time to time. Homework diaries/ group call are used to communicate homework tasks to pupils and parents.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
