Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

Children are prepared for responsible citizenship by developing values, beliefs and attitudes compatible with living in a modern, democratic and multicultural society. Children are expected to develop acceptable standards of behaviour, courtesy and respect to all members of staff and to each other. All adults adopt a positive approach to the question of discipline and the relationship between children and adults is based on mutual consideration and respect.

As a Silver Rights Respecting School, children are prepared for responsible citizenship by developing values, beliefs and attitudes compatible with living in a modern, democratic and multicultural society. We endeavour to promote positive behaviour through the following approaches:

- Whole school ethos of inclusivity, respect and responsibility.
- Good behaviour is promoted through the strong values within our school.
- Children are expected to develop acceptable standards of behaviour, courtesy and respect to all members of staff and to each other.
- All adults adopt a positive and restorative approach to the question of discipline and the relationship between children and adults is based on mutual consideration.
- Staff provide appropriate, interesting learning and teaching experiences, within a well ordered school environment.
- All classes take part in weekly wellbeing activities through circle time or mental and emotional wellbeing programmes.
- Parental support and co-operation in avoiding and eliminating instances of indiscipline will be sought at an early stage. Whenever appropriate we work co-operatively with parents, Psychological Services, Social Work Department and Police in order to promote positive behaviour and support pupils.

St Columba's has a robust policy on acting on patterns of bullying incidents. We give clear messages about acceptable and unacceptable behaviour and hold regular anti-bullying campaigns and assemblies to deter potential incidents. We reassure children and parents that all matters of bullying are taken seriously and dealt with effectively and proportionately.

School uniform

All Dumfries and Galloway schools have a dress code which encourages pupils to dress in a way appropriate to attendance at school. For more information on School Uniform, Dress Code, and School Clothing Grants visit www.dumgal.gov.uk

Our school colours are yellow and blue and our uniform consists of:

- White or blue polo-shirt or shirt
- Blue sweater with a school badge,
- Black or grey trousers / black or grey skirt for girls.
- In summer many girls wear the school summer dress and many boys prefer black or grey school shorts.
- For weekly outdoor learning lessons we ask that pupils come prepared with warm, waterproof clothes and wellies.

Clothing which is unacceptable in school under any circumstances would include football strips, items which display political or inappropriate slogans and or clothes that may be cause health and safety concerns e.g. loose fitting clothes or dangling jewellery.

The school uniform is fully supported by all our parents and pupils. Uniform order forms are sent home once a year and requests for further order forms can be made through the school office.

Parents in receipt of a grant for footwear and clothing from the authority will be encouraged to purchase items which are in accordance with the school dress code.

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

The Naturally D&G local provenance for a sustainable future ensures that meals are freshly prepared with seasonal ingredients and are free from undesirable additives.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school. Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Free Travel for 5 - 22 year olds

From 31 January 2022 all children and young people aged 5-22 will be entitled to free bus travel in Scotland. You can apply for free travel online from today at www.getyournec.scot (This cannot be done through your school)

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

There are many things which as a parent you can do to help support your child's learning:

- Listen, talk and encourage your child this has a huge impact on your child's learning
- Encourage your child to talk about their learning, what is happening at school and what they enjoy
- Encourage your child to talk about their strength and next steps in learning
- Attend school open afternoons and Celebrations of Learning - this shows your interests and allows you time to see your child in their learning environment
- Read with and to your child any reading is good reading
- Look for opportunities to join the school and take part in parental involvement activities within the school environment
- Seek out hobbies and clubs for your child and support them to develop a range of different skills.
- Support homework and practice of skills we use Seesaw, an online app to post homework and recent learning achievements.
- Attend Parent's Evenings/ Learning Conversations where we share targets and learning successes.
- Talk to your child about how they are feeling

Parental engagement makes a huge difference to your child's development and we look for many opportunities to encourage this throughout your child's time at St Columba's.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
