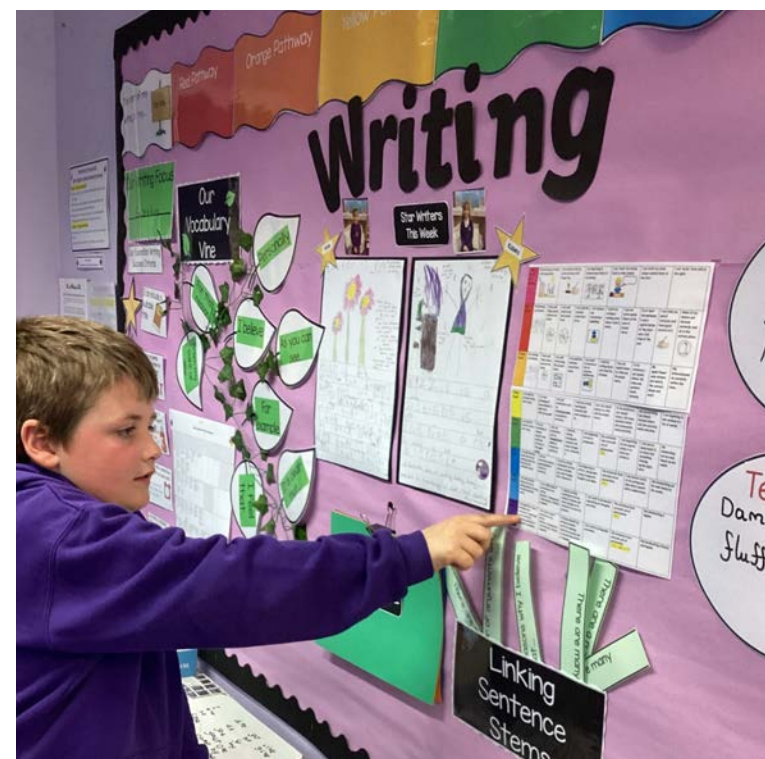

Positive Behaviour and Celebrating Success

We promote positive behaviour through our Positive Relationships policy, which was co-created with learners, staff, parent/carers and community, and is based on Respect for All: The National Approach to Anti-Bullying for Scotland's Children and Young People policy, UN Convention on the Rights of the Child and Getting It Right for Every Child. All behaviour is communication so we believe the most successful way to promote positive relationships is to create an ethos where we try to understand behaviours through restorative practices and give appropriate support where needed, referring to the Principles of Nurture throughout. Staff are trained in these theories and show compassion and patience when managing behaviours. The wider impact of challenging behaviour is always acknowledged and positive solutions to move forward are supported. We celebrate success and real-life examples of learners displaying our school values in a variety of ways. Our school reward system, House Points,

are aligned with our values, as is our "HT's VIPs" monthly award. Exciting treats are offered at the end of each month to the winning house, as suggested by the children. We also give children opportunities to take the lead on their learning. All our children participant in our Pupil Voice groups. Our current pupil voice groups are Rights Respecting School, Digital Leaders and Caring for our Community. Alongside these we also have an active Pupil Council, Reading Buddies and pupil led lunch groups.

School uniform

Grants and Bursaries

Scottish Child Payment

Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family. It's a weekly payment of £25 that you can get for every child you look after who's under 16 years of age. You'll get the payment every 4 weeks if your application is successful.

Best Start Grant

Best Start Grant and Best Start Foods are payments that help towards the costs of being pregnant or looking after a child. Best Start Grant is made up of 3 one-off payments:

- Pregnancy and Baby Payment
- Early Learning Payment
- School Age Payment

Best Start Foods is a prepaid card that can be used in shops or online to buy healthy foods like milk or fruit. The payments you can get now will depend on:

- how far along in your pregnancy you are
- how old your child is

Clothing Grant

The award of clothing grants is to assist with the cost of school clothing for families who are on a qualifying benefit or on low income. The current award is presently £134 per primary school child and £150 per secondary school child.

School Meals

The Naturally D&G local provenance for a sustainable future ensures that meals are freshly prepared with seasonal ingredients and are free from undesirable additives.

Free School Meals

Free school meals are provided for all pupils in Primary 1, 2, 3, 4 and 5. Confirmation of when this will be rolled out to Primary 6 and Primary 7 from the Scottish Government has yet to be confirmed.

In Nursery, eligible children can receive up to 1140 hours a year of Early Learning and Childcare. As part of this funded offer, the child will be entitled to one free meal and a snack each day.

Online pre-ordering of school meals is currently being rolled out to all secondary schools, information will be supplied by your school.

Free school meals can lead to a large saving in each year, nursery and primary school pupils can save £361 and secondary school pupils can save £370. You'll also be helping your child's school if you qualify for free school meals. Some Scottish Government funding provided directly to schools is linked to the number of pupils who are entitled to free school meals.

Special Dietary Requirements

Facilities Services – Catering provide special dietary requirements for food allergy and intolerances; medically prescribed diets; or diets for religious or cultural reasons specific meals for children of different ethnic origin. Simply ask the school for a Special Diet Request Forms to allow us to inform the catering team who will discuss your child's requirements in full. All Children with allergens should register with the catering team as soon as they are aware that their child has an allergen or intolerance to food.

Scottish Child Payment and Bridging Payments

The Scottish Government's Scottish Child Payment helps towards the costs of supporting your family and, as of 14 November 2022, applications are now open for all children under the age of 16. The weekly value of this award will also increase to £25 as of this point.

Free Travel for 5 - 22 year olds

From 31 January 2022 all children and young people aged 5-22 will be entitled to free bus travel in Scotland. You can apply for free travel online from today at www.getyournec.scot (This cannot be done through your school)

Attendance

It is your responsibility as parents to ensure that your child/children attend school regularly. For the safety of all children it is important for you to telephone the school office prior to/at the beginning of the absence. Absences are recorded in class registers and frequent or irregular absences not supported by a reasonable excuse, will be notified to parents and the matter may be referred to the Opportunities for All Service. If possible please, try to make dental/medical appointments outwith school hours. However, if this is not possible please inform us in writing or by telephone of the appointment and arrange to collect your child from class.

Pupils who need to leave school during the school day ie doctor /dentist appointments, must be collected by a named contact confirmed with the school office. They must also report to the school office on their return to school.

Curriculum for Excellence

Curriculum for Excellence (CfE), now known as 'Scotland's Curriculum,' is bringing learning to life in the way education is delivered for all 3-18 year olds in nursery, primary, secondary, at college and via workplace or community learning. It aims to respond and adapt flexibly to meet the needs of an ever changing and evolving world and Scotland's place within it. At its heart lies a constant commitment and drive towards excellence and equity, to raise standards, improve knowledge, develop skills for all learners and close the gap between the lowest and highest achievers by ensuring everyone has an equal opportunity to be successful, no matter what their background or circumstances. Ultimately, it aims to nurture children and young people as successful learners, confident individuals, effective contributors and responsible citizens.

Broad General Education

Children and young people work their way through Experiences and Outcomes in each of the five Curriculum Levels (Early, First, Second, Third, Fourth) and in each of the eight Curricular Areas. The five Curricular Levels span pre-school to the end of S3. This is the Broad General Education. Pupils progress at their own pace, working through the Experiences and Outcomes of the most appropriate level for them. Pupils will be supported in collecting evidence of their achievements, with a profile of these being produced in P7 and S3.

CfE also includes Languages, Expressive arts, Religious and moral education, Sciences, Social studies and Technologies. The responsibility for the curriculum offer in your school sits with the Headteacher.

Curriculum rationale

In 2021-22, school staff, pupils and members of our school community all contributed in the creation of a school curriculum rationale. We organised our curriculum experiences around the 4 contexts for learning highlighted by Education Scotland:

- 1. Ethos and Life of the school** We provide the opportunity for our learners to contribute to their community, participate in responsible decision making, contribute as leaders and role models and offer support to others.
- 2. Opportunities for Personal Achievement** We provide opportunities for our learners to develop their resilience and confidence, experience a range of achievements in the classroom and beyond, take on challenges, work closely with different organisations and have their voices heard. We support our learners to participate in/lead after school/ lunch clubs, as well as recognise wider achievements out with school setting.
- 3. Curriculum areas and subjects** We prioritise Literacy and Numeracy as core areas of education and teach these subjects discreetly and also in a cross-curricular way using a range of learning contexts. In addition to this, we seek to ensure that Health Education remains a high priority as we want to support our pupils to be resilient, sociable learners who have developed healthy attitudes.
- 4. Interdisciplinary Learning** We address the remaining 3 areas of the curriculum (Social Studies, Science and Technologies) in an Interdisciplinary Learning manner. This ensures that our children gain a breadth of experience and are able to transfer skills and make connections between learning.

- Be asked your opinion by the parent council on issues relating to the school and education it provides
- Work in partnership with staff
- Enjoy taking part in school life in whatever way possible

How is my child doing?

There will be several opportunities for you to discuss your child's progress. This may be through informal discussion with the teacher or at Parents' Nights/ Learning Conversations, formal reports or for some it may be through more formal, focussed meetings with other agencies.



Helping Your Child and Family Learning

We review homework procedures regularly and involve parent/carers, staff and learners. Class teachers will have autonomy on homework they send but will be moderated as a team to ensure there are not huge differences class to class.

We will also ensure that home learning is;

- nothing new – revises what has already been taught
- purposeful – relevant to current learning
- manageable – for different family dynamics which are varied across the school
- accessible – does not require additional resources which may not be available in the home
- timely – sufficient time given to complete and return the task (considering the age and stage of learners)
- clear – instructions are very clear and support offered if required

We understand that there will be occasions when family circumstances prevent completion of homework tasks for a number of different reasons. Please communicate when this may be happening to the class teacher who will show compassion in trying times.

Support for All

Support for Learners

All children receive support at school and nursery to help them learn. 'Additional support for learning' is how we describe any support that is extra or different to the help that most children receive. Most of this additional support is provided by teachers in mainstream classes, focussed on learning and support to be fully involved in school life. For the majority of children and young people this will be delivered in a mainstream classroom supported by their classroom teacher for a few this will mean some additional support alongside the classroom teacher, and for a very few this will be part-time or full-time provision in a school with a learning centre or an inclusion base.

School Improvements

Each year the school will publish a School Improvement Plan which outlines the key priorities for the school during the year ahead, following engagement with staff, pupils and parents. The plan indicates the expected impact of priorities on pupil learning, as well as providing brief information about the key tasks to be taken forward. Both the report and the plan are published on the school's web-site and are also available in hard copy, on request. In May / June of each year, the school publishes a Standards & Quality Report providing all stakeholders with a comprehensive summary of the school's work and learners' achievements over the last year. The first part of this report provides an overview of the school's progress in addressing its key priorities, while the second part gives information about, for example, how well pupils are learning and achieving;



how well the school is supporting children/young people to develop and learn.

In June we publish a School Improvement Plan. This plan details our key priorities for the school year ahead, indicating the expected impact of priorities on our pupil's learning. These are created in consultation with school staff, pupils and our parental community. We evaluate the aspects of the plan on an annual basis and send a progress report to be shared with families describing where we have made improvements and what our next steps are.

Health and Safety

Emergency Procedures (including Safer Together Guidance)

If your child feels unwell or have hurt themselves during the school day they must report this to an adult in the school. If we feel that they would be better at home we will telephone you or your emergency contact. Minor accidents, e.g. cuts, bruises, are dealt with by the school staff. Serious accidents are few, but should one occur your child will be immediately taken either to your doctor or to hospital, if necessary, and you or your emergency contact will be notified. We cannot stress enough the importance of supplying the school with the relevant information we require in such a situation, i.e. your own home and work number and a telephone number of an emergency contact. **Please remember that if your child stays in more than one home setting contact details should take account of this.**

Health Care (inc First Aid)

Many children will require their health care needs to be met at sometime within the nursery/school environment, for most children this will be for short periods of time only, but for some children this may require more long-term planning and support. If your child has any health care needs, please contact the school to discuss arrangements. Full details of the support available and your role as a parent and the role of your child are contained within Health Care in Schools 3-18 (NHS and Dumfries and Galloway Council) which is available from the school.
